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### **Special Focus of Brussels**

"The 3-Shift Model for Street Cleaning in Brussels -7 days a week, 52 weeks a year"



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
- The municipality is responsible for cleaning municipal roads.
- The Brussels-Capital Region has contracted with "Bruxelles-Propreté", a regional agency, to clean streets and sidewalks in the region.
- In addition, as part of the "Cleanness Plan", "Bruxelles-Propreté" also cleans certain streets and sidewalks which would otherwise have to be cleaned by the municipality.
- "Bruxelles-Propreté" is also in charge of household waste collection in the Brussels-Capital Region.





### **Brussels - Facts and Figures**

- Brussels-Capital Region: (=12 communities)
- Length of public road network: 1,875,677 km
- Inhabitants: 964,405
- Commuters: 400,000







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# Subdividing the Municipal Road Network/ Bruxelles-Propreté

- Streets maintained by the 19 municipalities:1,352 km
- Regional streets and streets taken on from municipalities which are maintained by the agency: 396 km







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### The Agency: Bruxelles-Propreté

- Staff: 1,907
- Fleet: 548 vehicles
- Infrastructure: 7 units and one head office
- Treatment facility, incinerator, sorting plants (paper, plastics..), composting facility operated by subsidiaries
- Budget : 141,895,000 €



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# **Agents Involved in Cleaning**

- Bruxelles-Propreté : collects household waste, treats waste, and cleans streets and sidewalks in the region
- 19 municipalities
- In addition:
  - IBGE (Institute for Environmental Management in Brussels):
- in charge of cleaning regional greens, parks and the Soignes forest
  - AED (management and equipment of vehicles)
    - in charge of cleaning tunnels and collecting public litter bins





# **Cleaning Tasks Performed by Bruxelles-Propreté**

1. Manual sweeping of gutters and sidewalks







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#### 2. Mechanical cleaning of gutters and sidewalks



Unaccompanied (expressways)

Accompanied by human sweeper





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#### 3. Maintenance of gullies

- Cleaning intervals : 4 times a year on average
  More often in case of heavy rainfalls or impending floods
- Number of gullies to take care of per day and unit: 80 to 120 depending on traffic

Bruxelles-Propreté: 15,500 gullies





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#### 4. Emptying of municipal waste bins

- Total number of waste bins to be emptied by Bruxelles-Propreté: 4,460
- Collection cycle of bins: depends on the (pre-defined) street type:
  - Twice a day
  - Twice a day
  - Every other day





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#### 5. Removal of graffiti and illegal bills on public buildings



Our approach: avoid chains of action and reaction (behavioral study of graffiti sprayers)





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#### 6. Collection of fly-tipped waste

Key hubs and important public places are checked daily; 7 trucks with grippers and 3 pick-ups are available.

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#### 8. Special tasks

#### 8.1. High-pressure cleaning systems for sidewalks, streets and squares







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#### 8.2. Degreasing and disinfection (unpleasant odor) of places or building fronts





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#### 8.3. Removing chewing gum







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#### 8.4. Extra jobs

- Cleaning at tramway stops, designated dog areas, subway exits
- Cleaning after events : 20km Brussels marathon, national holidays
- Cleaning after markets on Saturdays and Sundays
- Spring cleaning and campaigns together with municipalities



# Methodology

1. Definition of the street type based on the amount of traffic

- A: Busy street with housing estates and popular shops:
  - A1: 13 times/week A2: 12 times/week
- B: Busy street with housing estates and small businesses:
  - B1: 6 times/week B2: 5 times/week
- C: Residential street with housing estates:
- D: Residential street with one-family houses:
- E: Road with isolated one-family houses:
- F: Street in populated industrial area:
- G: Street in uninhabited industrial area :
- H: Expressways (uninhabited)

3 times a week twice a week once a week twice a week twice a week 3 times a week





#### 2. Identifying "showcase" areas

• Streets or places where a high level of cleanness should be maintained

#### 3. Identifying problematic areas

- Streets or places with recurring problems, requiring new solutions.
- Outside help with cleaning (more checks, threat of punishment)
- Narrowing cleaning intervals

#### 4. Analyzing indicators of cleanness and setting performance goals


- Follow-up the complaints voiced via "Hello Cleanness" (toll-free hotline maintained by the agency)
- Inspectors report on activities after on-site checks
- Steering committee for the cleaning services performed by the 19 municipalities






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### **4 Cleaning Districts**

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### **Staff Roster**

- Morning: 5 am 11:30 am 50 workers
  - Mechanical sweeping
  - Gutter cleaning
  - High-pressure cleaning
  - Disinfection of bins, at train stations ...
  - 6:30 am 1 pm 279 workers
    - Manual and mechanical sweeping
    - Bin emptying
    - Collection of dumped waste and removal of graffiti





# **Staff Roster**

- Afternoon: 1:30 pm 8 pm 118 workers
  - Manual and mechanical sweeping
  - Emptying, gutter cleaning
  - Bin emptying
  - Collection of dumped waste
- Night: 6:30 pm midnight 36 workers
  - Mechanical sweeping
- N.B. Mechanical sweeping accompanied by human sweeper (manual pre-sweeping) (exception: expressways)
  - Typically, mechanical cleaning by teams of 3-4 workers
  - Maintenance & treatment of building fronts





### Who Works on Weekends?

The staff roster is posted 3 months in advance

- Obligatory: every 3rd Saturday, but Wednesday off instead
- Contractual: 2 days off (Thursday, Friday), but on duty every third weekend

The staff roster is set up with a view to avoiding overtime. Workers on weekend duty work less than those on weekdays.

This means:

- Wednesday
- Thursday •
- Friday •
- Saturday •
- Sunday •

- X = 1/3 of workers off duty
  - Y = 1/3 of workers off duty
- see Thursday
  - X + Y on duty
    - Y on duty






# **Staffing Considerations**

- Priority: transferring older workers (50 years) from collection to cleaning
- Cleaning activities in run-down neighborhoods as part of rehabilitation programs
- Internal training
  - Driver's license for trucks (for those interested)
  - Driving lessons by in-house training staff for all vehicles





### **Organization Chart of the Cleaning Division**



- For every street maintained by the agency, the following information is available:
  - The type of street
  - Which district is responsible for emptying waste bins
  - The days of manual and/of mechanical cleaning as well as the district responsible for it
- When complaints are voiced via the hotline, the district or the team responsible can be identified easily.
- On weekends
  - Cleaning of streets which have to be cleaned 6 or 7 days a week and cleaning of traffic hubs which can be cleaned more easily at that time (less traffic)
  - Cleaning after markets, flea markets, and festivals

### **Problems Encountered**

#### A. Vehicles parking along the sidewalks

Solutions:

- a) Manual sweeping or sucking with glutton
- b) Putting up "No Parking" signs by authority

#### **B.** Collection of street sweepings

Done in 2 ways:

- The sweepings are collected in bags and disposed of by the collection teams.
- The sweepings are collected in bags and disposed of by the sweeping teams.





# **Problems Encountered (continued)**

#### C. Fly-tipping

1. Bulky waste

In particular in isolated residential areas and in older housing estates with low-income residents or immigrants

- 2. People set out waste bags, ignoring the collection cycles
- 3. Bins overflowing with shopping bags full of waste
- 4. etc...

Solutions:

- Information campaigns using all media to prevent fly-tipping and raise awareness
- Information bus (fairs, schools, festivals,...)
- Repression (24 inspectors, 7 days a week)









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
